Religious Education helps pupils to make sense of religion and worldviews, reflecting on their own ideas and ways of living

Key Theological Vocabulary

- Christian A person who follows and believes in the teachings of Jesus, God and the Holy Spirit. (The Trinity)
- Bible a religious/holy book for Christians that guides their lives
- God Christians believe in one God, who appears in three persons-God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit (Trinity)
- Incarnation Christian belief that God came to earth as Jesus
- Gospels Christians read the Gospels as it tells them about Jesus' life. The first four books of the New Testament-Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. The literal meaning of gospel is 'good news.'
- Messiah Christian belief in a saviour, who has been chosen to bring salvation to humans
- Saviour a person who saves someone from danger or difficulty
- prophecy a prediction of what will happen in the future

- Explain the place of Incarnation and Messiah within the 'big story' of the Bible
- Identify Gospel and prophecy texts, using technical terms
- Explain connections between biblical texts, Incarnation and Messiah, using theological terms

Making connections

 Weigh up how far the idea of Jesus as the 'Messiah' – a Saviour from God – is important in the world today and, if it is true, what difference that might make in people's lives, giving good reasons for their answers.

- Comment on how the idea that Jesus is the Messiah makes sense in the wider story of the Bible
